Dear Mends,

Thank you for taking the time to read this invitation to take part in our Christian Stewardship at St John's and St Julian's. Thank you for all that you give to the living ministry of Christ's Church here – your financial contributions, your use of your time, talents and energy, your daily witness and service in the world, your regularity in worship and prayer. Thank you for encouraging me, and your brothers and sisters, to believe that we can have faith in the future.

That's what we've called this Christian Stewardship Campaign: 'Faith in the Future.' Of course, as Christians we *don't* put our faith in the future in a vague, things-might-get-better kind of way. We have faith in the future because we have already put our faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, who is Lord of our future. Our confidence is in him.

Our church exists to proclaim him, to worship him and to bear witness to him. In the power of the Holy Spirit we believe we can do this in the future as confidently and courageously as we have in the past. We're asking each other, seriously and prayerfully, to consider our giving – our giving of financial resources to support the life and work of the Church, and our giving of our time and talents in the service of the Christian community. As things stand, we need real growth in both areas. The following pages set this out. Any member of our PCC will be happy to talk to you more about opportunities for giving, service and involvement. I commend this invitation to your prayers and your action.

Why do we value our churches?

- Both churches open all day, every day, with a welcome for all, in the heart of the city
- The daily Mass, the heartbeat of our parish life, and times for prayer and spiritual growth

How's our money spent?

We take great care in our expenditure and we work hard not to live beyond our means. Here's a snapshot of what we might expect to spend in 2019, based on last year's accounts and the commitments that we know about for this year.

Parish Share	£61,000
Altar expenses (candles, wine, altar breads etc)	£3,400
Office expenses (administration, printing etc)	£2,500
Insurance	£3,000
Heat, light and water	£5,000
Repairs	£1,500
Music	£1,000

Adding this up shows that running our churches will cost around £78,000 this year – and that's just to keep on doing what we do, without any thought of what *else* we might like to do.

What's the Parish Share?

You'll have noticed the big figure up there! The Parish Share is the contribution which is requested from us towards the work of the Diocese of Norwich – the family of Church of England churches in Norfolk and Waveney of which we are part. All parishes are asked to make a contribution towards the costs of the Diocese. The size of the contribution varies from parish to parish depending, largely, on the ministry they receive.

To keep one full-time priest in a parish (like we have in our own parish) costs about £56,000 a year. The Diocese has some income from other sources (such as land and fees) which it uses to subsidise that cost. The money we contribute to the Diocese through our Parish Share pays for priests to receive a stipend and pension, be housed adequately and receive training and support. It also pays for costs which all our churches share between them: the training of curates, central administration, support for mission and ministry, church schools, work with children, youth and families and so on. As Catholic Christians, we believe deeply that the Church is bigger than just the congregation in which we worship on Sundays – and the Parish Share expresses that reality. It's the way in which we make a contribution to the Body of Christ.

Where does our money come from?

Our Church Family, basically! Certainly not the Government, like some people think! No: regular, committed giving from our members is the foundation of everything we do. We would fall apart overnight without it. We are by no stretch of the imagination a wealthy parish. Our reserves are very limited.

Last year, we received £34,300 in voluntary giving from our worshippers and visitors. That money comes from collections in church (about £6,000), standing orders at the bank (£21,620), our donations boxes in the church wall (about £5,500) and some smaller donations and one-off gifts. We are truly thankful for everything we receive, and we know it often comes at personal sacrifice. You'll realise, however, that it falls far short of the costs of running our churches.

We also get some money from reclaiming the tax paid on money given to us through the Gift Aid scheme (about £5,500 last year), so **it's really important that everyone who pays tax and gives money to our Church has signed a Gift Aid form** – it means we can claim an extra 25p for every £1 you give, at no extra cost to you. We also do some fundraising and receive small amounts in fees for weddings and funerals.

We are deeply fortunate to have help from historic sources to assist with the maintenance and care of our churches. A bequest made to St John's in 1542 (!) still generates an annual income for us to spend on the building and worship (£9,718 last year - which all went simply on routine running costs) and a large donation to St Julian's some years ago is available for us to claim expenses for running costs there (£5,137 last year).

There are also a handful of old charities and trusts, administered by the Parish Priest and Churchwardens, which don't belong to the PCC but which can be used occasionally to contribute to specific expenses, often connected with the building or worship.

We are very blessed to have these funds to call on when needed: many churches have to meet all their running costs simply from their voluntary giving.

For us to continue our journey towards financial and spiritual health, it's vital for us to grow regular, committed, voluntary giving to our Church.

How much should I give?

That's entirely up to you. It will vary from person to person, based on their means, responsibilities and circumstances. A regular gift of, say, £13 a week (which is the national average), might be hugely generous and sacrificial from one person, but somebody else might not even notice it going out of their purse! We are all different and as Christians we should pray about how much we give and see it is part of our discipleship. **It's not the amount that's important: it's the sacrifice and the generosity that it represents.**

Jesus explained this to his disciples:

'He looked up and saw rich people putting their gifts into the treasury; he also saw a poor widow put in two small copper coins. He said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them; for all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in all she had to live on."'

St Luke 21.1-4

As we think and pray about what to give, there are some basic principles which can help us:

- Giving should always be in proportion to our means.
- Giving should always be **regular**, which means that the Church can budget and plan.
- Giving should always be generous a genuine response to God in thanksgiving for his goodness and blessings, not just a 'donation to a good cause'.
- Giving should always be **joyful** because when we give we know it will enable our Church to fulfil its God-given tasks of worship, witness, welcome and service.

That's wonderful! Thank you. Every gift makes a difference – and giving is part of our discipleship. It's good for our souls!

My Pledge

Enclosed in this pack you'll find a form headed 'My Pledge'. **Complete this form to tell us what you plan to give regularly** – weekly or monthly – to support our Church. It's not a contract: it just means that you're letting us know about what you expect to be able to give, which helps us plan for the future. Whenever your circumstances change, the amount you give can change too.

Standing Orders

The easiest way to give regularly to the Church is to set up a standing order – that means that each month (or at another regular interval of your choosing) your bank transfers an amount of money to the Church. This is administratively efficient, hassle-free, saves you remembering to bring cash to church with you, and means your giving is regular. It can be changed at any time by you instructing your bank. We encourage everyone who can do so to give to St John's and St Julian's in this way. If you'd like to do so, please complete and return the form which is headed 'Standing Order'.

Weekly envelopes

If you'd prefer to give **cash**, we can supply you with a **box of envelopes for each Sunday**, to help you give a regular amount each week. Just tick the box on the form headed 'My Pledge' to let us know you'd like these.

Gift Aid

If you pay tax and you give regularly to our Church, please complete the form headed 'Gift Aid declaration.' This means that the Church can reclaim the tax paid on any money you give us: it adds an extra 25p to every £1 you give.

It's expressed partly in the use of our time, talents and energy for the service of the Christian community.

Being part of any community is about getting involved – and the Church, the community of faith, is no different. Our sharing in the active life of the Church deepens our relationship with God and with other people.

Each of us has unique, God-given talents and gifts. There are many ways in which our Church Family members use these to weave together the rich tapestry of life at St John's and St Julian's – and we want to use this campaign to thank very warmly everyone who contributes so much to the life of the Church.

It's also a good time for all of us to think about the different roles, activities and opportunities for service in our Church, and consider where we might like to get involved. No part of our life is a 'closed club' and we warmly welcome new involvement and fresh ideas.

Of course, life can be busy, but the more people we have contributing a little, the lighter the load for each person and the stronger and richer our Church Family life will be.
